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Equality Impact Assessment

The Equality Act 2010 replaces the previous anti-discrimination laws with a single Act. It simplifies the law, removing inconsistencies and making it easier for people to understand and comply with it. It also strengthens the law in important ways, to help tackle discrimination and equality. The majority of the Act came into force on 1 October 2010.

Public bodies are required in it to have due regard to the need to:

- eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct prohibited under the Act
- advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it, and
- foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it.

The public sector Equality Duty came into force on 5 April 2011. The duty ensures that all public bodies play their part in making society fairer by tackling discrimination and providing equality of opportunity for all. It ensures that public bodies consider the needs of all individuals in their day to day work – in shaping policy, delivering services and in relation to their own employees.

The Equality Duty encourages public bodies to understand how different people will be affected by their activities so that policies and services are appropriate and accessible to all and meet different people's needs. By understanding the effect of their activities on different people, and how inclusive public services can support and open up people's opportunities, public bodies are better placed to deliver policies and services that are efficient and effective.

The new equality duty replaces the three previous public sector equality duties, for race, disability and gender. The new equality duty covers the following protected characteristics:

- age
- disability
- gender reassignment
- pregnancy and maternity
- race – this includes ethnic or national origins, colour or nationality
- religion or belief – including lack of belief
- sex
- sexual orientation.

It also applies to marriage and civil partnership, but only in respect of the requirement to have due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination.

The Council has also agreed to treat people with care experience as if they had a protected characteristic.

Having due regard means consciously thinking about the three aims of the equality duty as part of the process of decision-making. This means that consideration of

equality issues must influence the decisions reached by public bodies, including how they act as employers, how they develop, evaluate and review policies, how they design, deliver and evaluate services, and how they commission and procure from others.

Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity involves considering the need to:

- remove or minimise disadvantages suffered by people due to their protected characteristics
- meet the needs of people with protected characteristics, and
- encourage people with protected characteristics to participate in public life or in other activities where their participation is low.

Fostering good relations involves tackling prejudice and promoting understanding between people who share a protected characteristic and others.

Complying with the equality duty may involve treating some people better than others, as far as this is allowed by discrimination law. For example, it may involve making use of an exception or the positive action provisions in order to provide a service in a way which is appropriate for people who share a protected characteristic.

The Equality Duty also explicitly recognises that disabled people's needs may be different from those of non-disabled people. Public bodies should therefore take account of disabled people's impairments when making decisions about policies or services. This might mean making reasonable adjustments or treating disabled people better than non-disabled people in order to meet their needs.

There is no explicit requirement to refer to the Equality Duty in recording the process of consideration but it is good practice to do so. Keeping a record of how decisions were reached will help public bodies demonstrate that they considered the aims of the Equality Duty. Keeping a record of how decisions were reached will help public bodies show how they considered the Equality Duty. Producing an Equality Impact Assessment after a decision has been reached will not achieve compliance with the Equality Duty.

It is recommended that assessments are carried out in respect of new or revised policies and that a copy of the assessment is included as an appendix to the report provided to the decision makers at the relevant Cabinet, Committee or Scrutiny meeting.

Where it is clear from initial consideration that a policy will not have any effect on equality for any of the protected characteristics, no further analysis or action is necessary.

Public bodies should take a proportionate approach when complying with the Equality Duty. In practice, this means giving greater consideration to the Equality Duty where a policy or function has the potential to have a discriminatory effect or

impact on equality of opportunity, and less consideration where the potential effect on equality is slight. The Equality Duty requires public bodies to think about people's different needs and how these can be met.

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5. What baseline quantitative data do you have about the policy or function relating to the different equality strands?

A consultation was held. There were 820 responses in all or which there were 114 responses from people who were of non-white, English, Scottish welsh or Northern Irish background- 17.2% of total responses. This is a very good proportion of people from diverse backgrounds.

298 of 820 respondents to the survey said their health was limited a lot or limited a little. Again this proportion is sufficiently reflective of people with health conditions to give satisfaction that their views have been gained.

There were responses to the consultation from every ward in Broxtowe with the majority from Beeston which is the main centre of population.

The gender split from the consultation responses was reflective of both sexes and there were responses from people who did not identify as male or female or preferred not to say

There were responses to the consultation from a wide spread of ages, including a significant number of over 65s but also people who were under 30.

In relation to the chosen priorities, regard has been had to quantitative data relating to priority areas and links are given in the report to a significant amount of data that can be analysed some of which relates to protected characteristics.

6. What baseline qualitative data do you have about the policy or function relating to the different equality strands?

As outlined above the consultation exercise obtained a significant amount of qualitative data (views, opinions and suggestions) which has been used to inform the suggested priorities and objectives in the plan.

7. What has stakeholder consultation, if carried out, revealed about the nature of the impact?

The views of all stakeholders have been considered. The plan is intended to have positive impacts across all the protected characteristic groups. A couple of specific examples might be

- Toilet strategy (of particular interest to older residents, those with children or disabilities)
- Proposals relating to violence against women and girls – (of particular interest to female residents)

The corporate plan emerging priorities intend to benefit all residents including those with protected characteristics. However, there are some measures which are intended to have particular benefits for some protected characteristic groups (examples such as those quoted above in 7)

☐ Is the policy or function likely to be equally accessed by all equality groups or communities? If no, can this be justified?

Yes there are no unequal impacts proposed, instead positive impacts for protected characteristic groups are intended. For example, where improvements are made to parks and open spaces as intended in the plan particular attention will be paid to ensuring adults and children with disabilities will be catered for.

The objective relating to working in partnership to help improve access to medical facilities in Eastwood and Beeston will benefit those with health conditions or disabilities.

☐ Are there barriers that might make access difficult or stop different equality groups or communities accessing the policy or function?

None identified as a result of the proposals in the emerging plan. The Council will continue to work to ensure its equality action plan continues to identify barriers experienced by protected characteristic groups, and works to overcome them. The council is actively working with groups such as the Disability forum to co-produce policy and strategy.

☐ Could the policy or function promote or contribute to equality and good relations between different groups? If so, how?

Yes, for example reference to events within the emerging objectives are highlighted as a measure that can bring communities together and enrich community life.

□ What further evidence is needed to understand the impact on equality?

The council will continue to deepen its understanding through objective data and partnership working, of inequalities which exist within Broxtowe.

9. On the basis of the analysis above what actions, if any, will you need to take in respect of each of the equality strands?

Age: The Council has good links and means of contacting and listening to older people in Broxtowe. We intend to balance this with deliberate intent to listen to and engage young people in Broxtowe.

Disability: Engage with the disability forum, the health sector, the voluntary sector, to implement policy in the most effective way

Gender: Through its employment practices the Council will continue to promote equality and tackle discrimination both direct and indirect.

Gender Reassignment: The Council needs to deepen its understanding of people with this protected characteristic

Marriage and Civil Partnership: No specific actions are identified

Pregnancy and Maternity: smoking rates in pregnancy is a particular concern and will be subject of partnership activity

Race: The Council has good links with people of different races and the consultation resulted in a good number of diverse responses. We intend to continue to build on these positive approaches in the future, especially in relation to work with refugees and asylum seekers. An example of where we are active in promoting equality include in the area of hate crime where it is racially motivated.

Religion and Belief: Through events and building relationships with all faith groups the Council intends to promote cohesion and understanding between people of different faiths and none. An example where we are active in promoting equality include in the area of hate crime where targeted against religion and belief

Sexual Orientation: The Council will continue to deepen its understanding of people with this protected characteristic. An example where we are active in promoting equality includes in the area of hate crime where it is targeted against LGBTQ+ groups

Care Experience: The Council continues to deepen its understanding of the particular needs of people with care experience. There is a proposal in the plan to consider subsidised access to leisure for carers

Executive summary

The Council recently ran a Let's Talk Broxtowe consultation to gather resident and employee feedback to help shape the new Corporate Plan for 2024-2028.

The survey was available online and in paper form and was open from 25 May until 14 July 2023. An incentive was offered to encourage participation.

In addition, a number of public roadshows and employee engagement events were held.

The survey was promoted in a number of ways including:

- Press releases
- Via the Email Me Service Email
- Member emails and briefings
- All staff email
- Articles in the Employee Briefing
- Intranet content including a banner on the homepage
- Website content including a banner on the homepage
- Digital business signage
- Physical displays and posters in public spaces
- A display in the Council Offices reception
- Stakeholder engagement with 145 stakeholder groups

Performance data for the various communications activity can be found in Appendix 1.

Highlights

820 responses were received to the survey – compared to 527 in 2019.

716 responses were online and 104 were on paper.

97 people attended the public roadshow events.

71% of respondents were satisfied or very satisfied with Broxtowe as a place to live.

54% of respondents were satisfied or very satisfied with the service they receive from the Council.

25% of respondents were satisfied or very satisfied with how the Council listens to them.

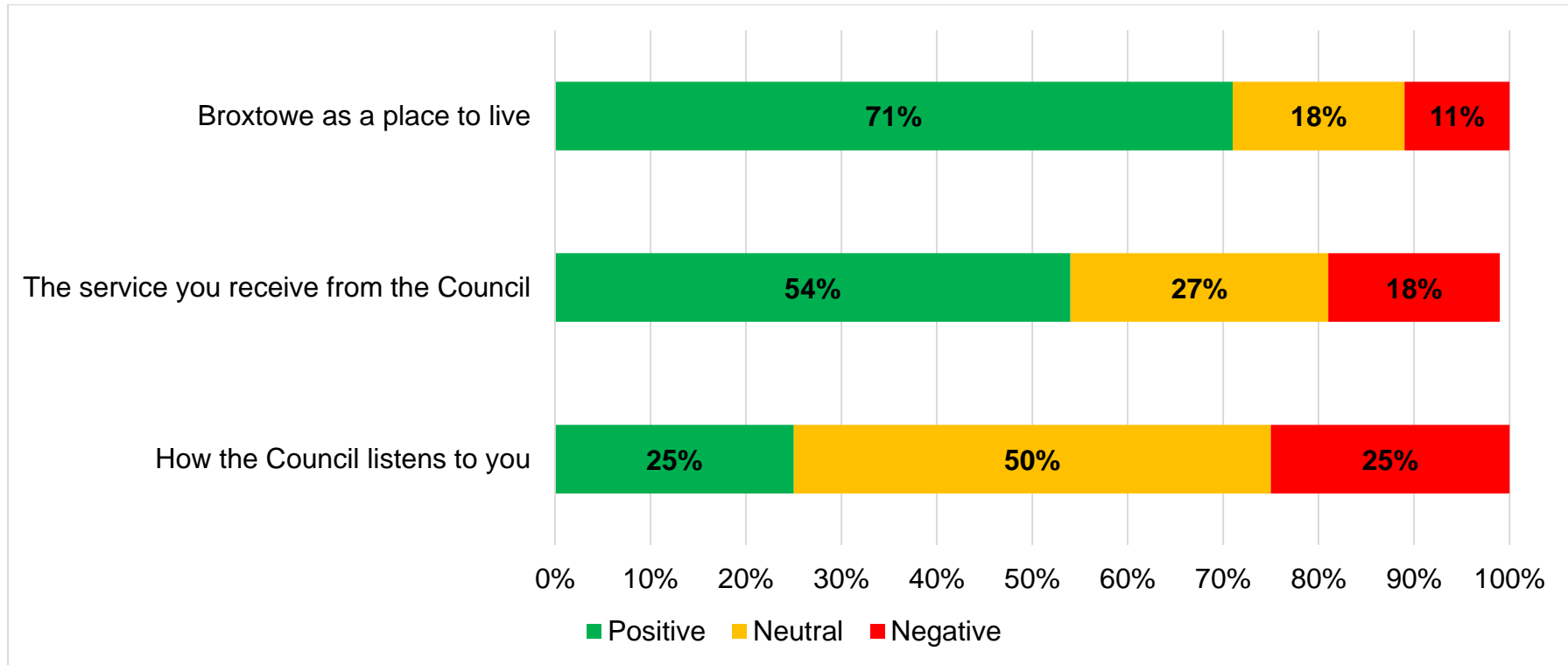
There was strong support for all of the five proposed priorities, with all receiving more than 75% positive responses.

From the proposed objectives, the three which received the most support were:

1. Reduce antisocial behaviour (96%)
2. Support people to live well with dementia and support those who are lonely or have mental health problem (94%)
3. Work with partners to reduce domestic violence and support survivors (94%)

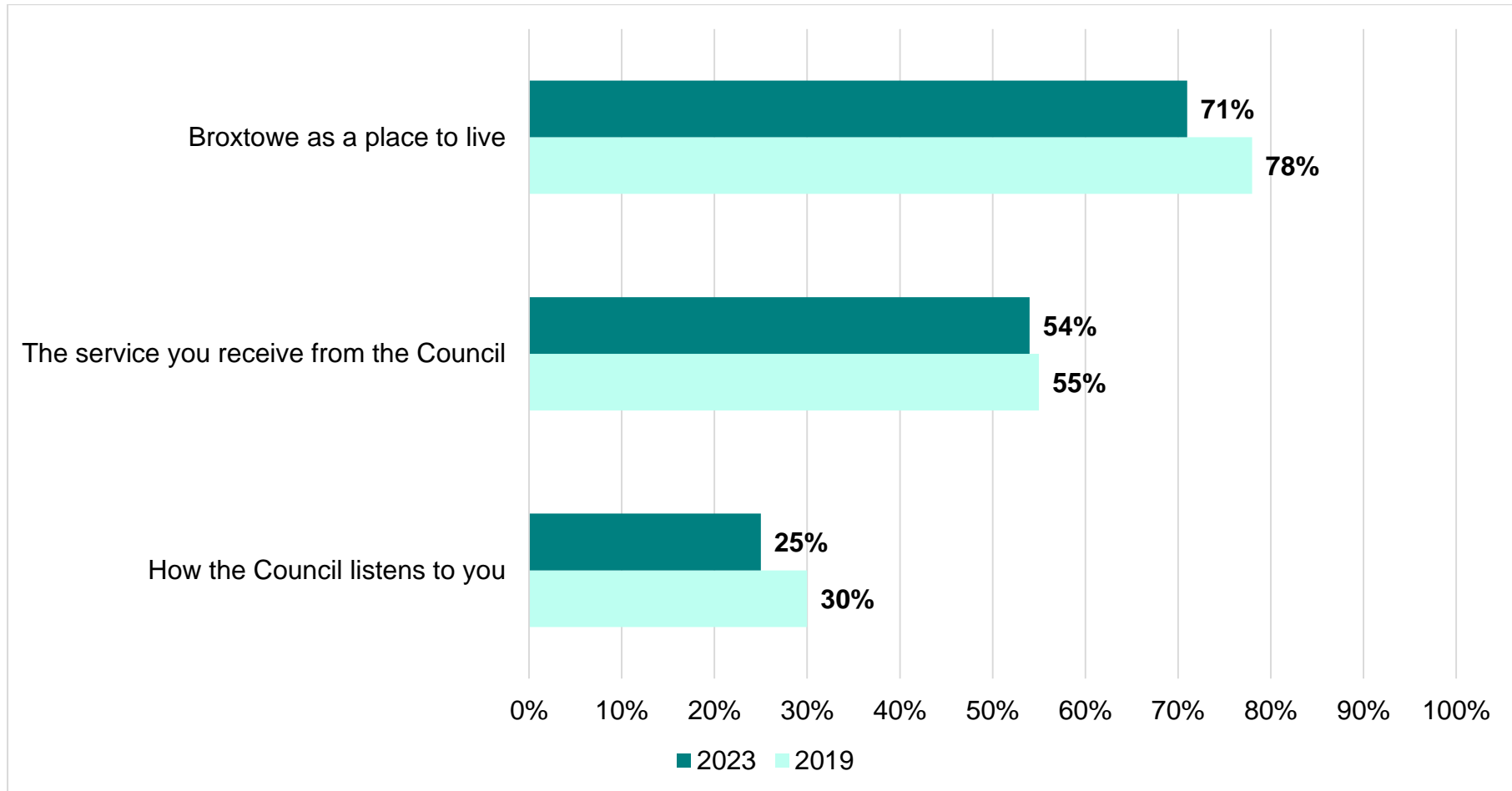
Overall satisfaction

The graph below illustrates the responses received relating to resident satisfaction over the last 12 months.



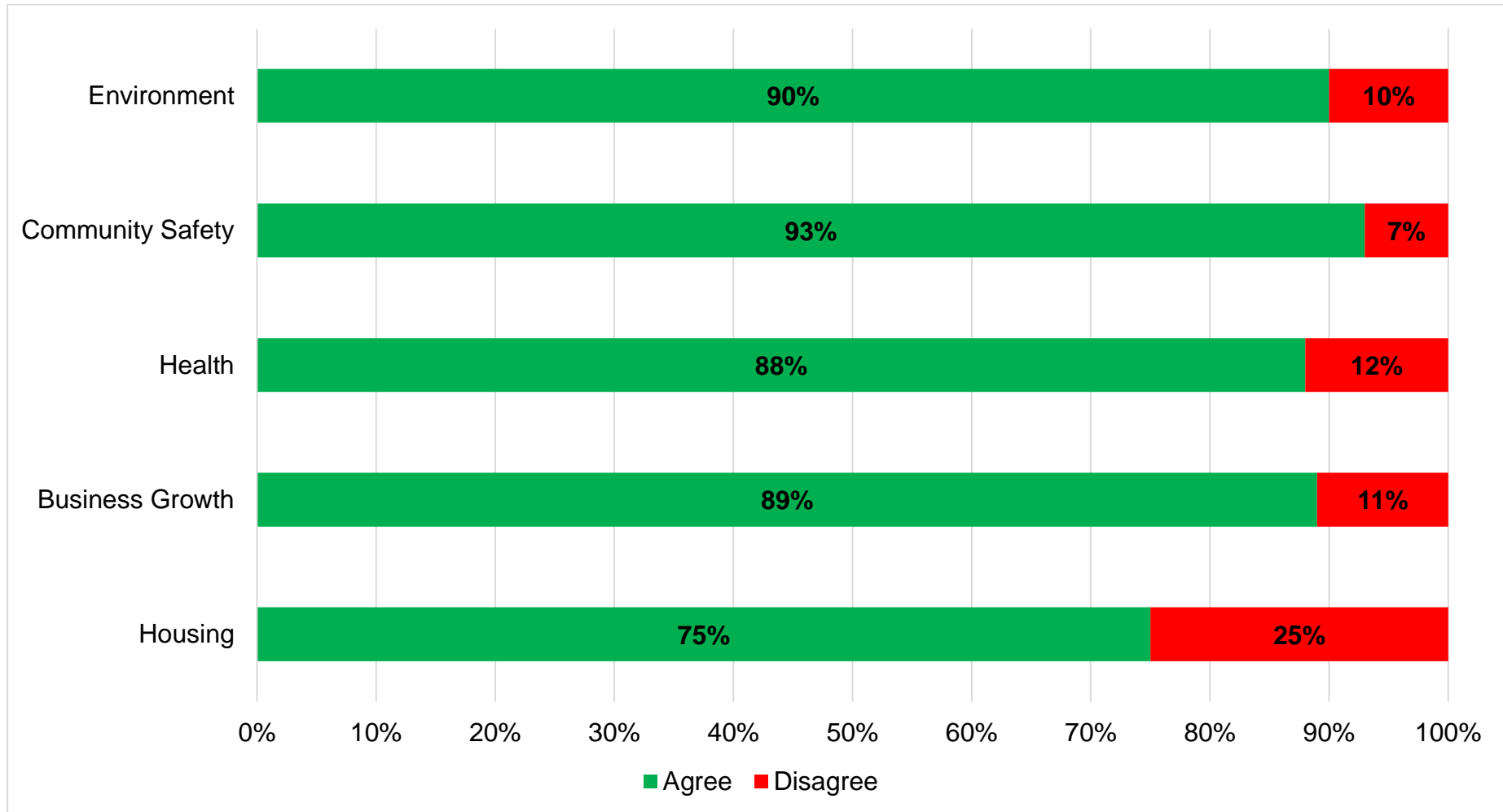
Overall satisfaction - change over time

The graph below illustrates the changes that have occurred over time in relation to the positive responses received in this section of the survey.



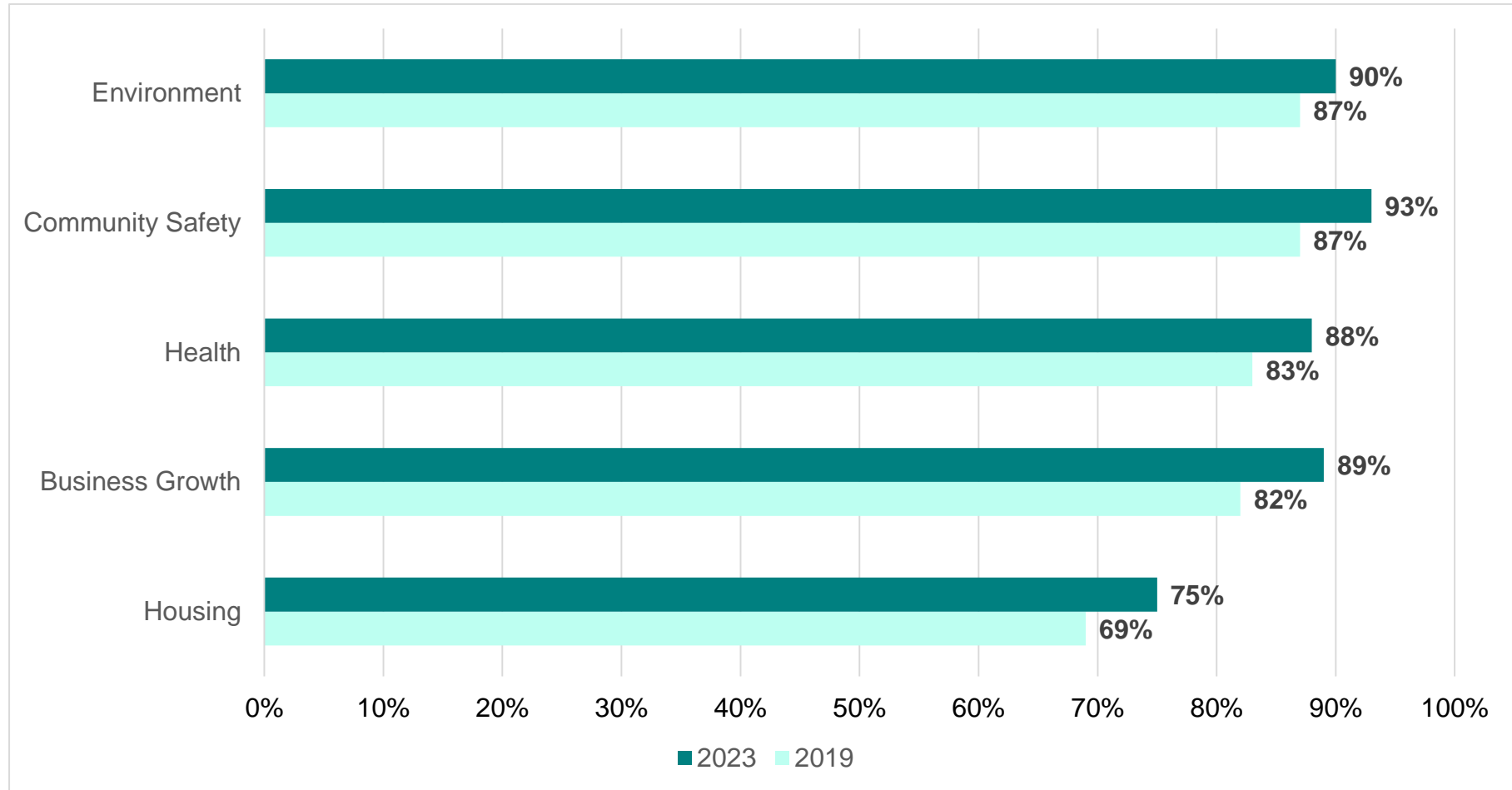
Priorities

The graph below illustrates the changes that have occurred over time in relation to the positive responses received in this section of the survey.

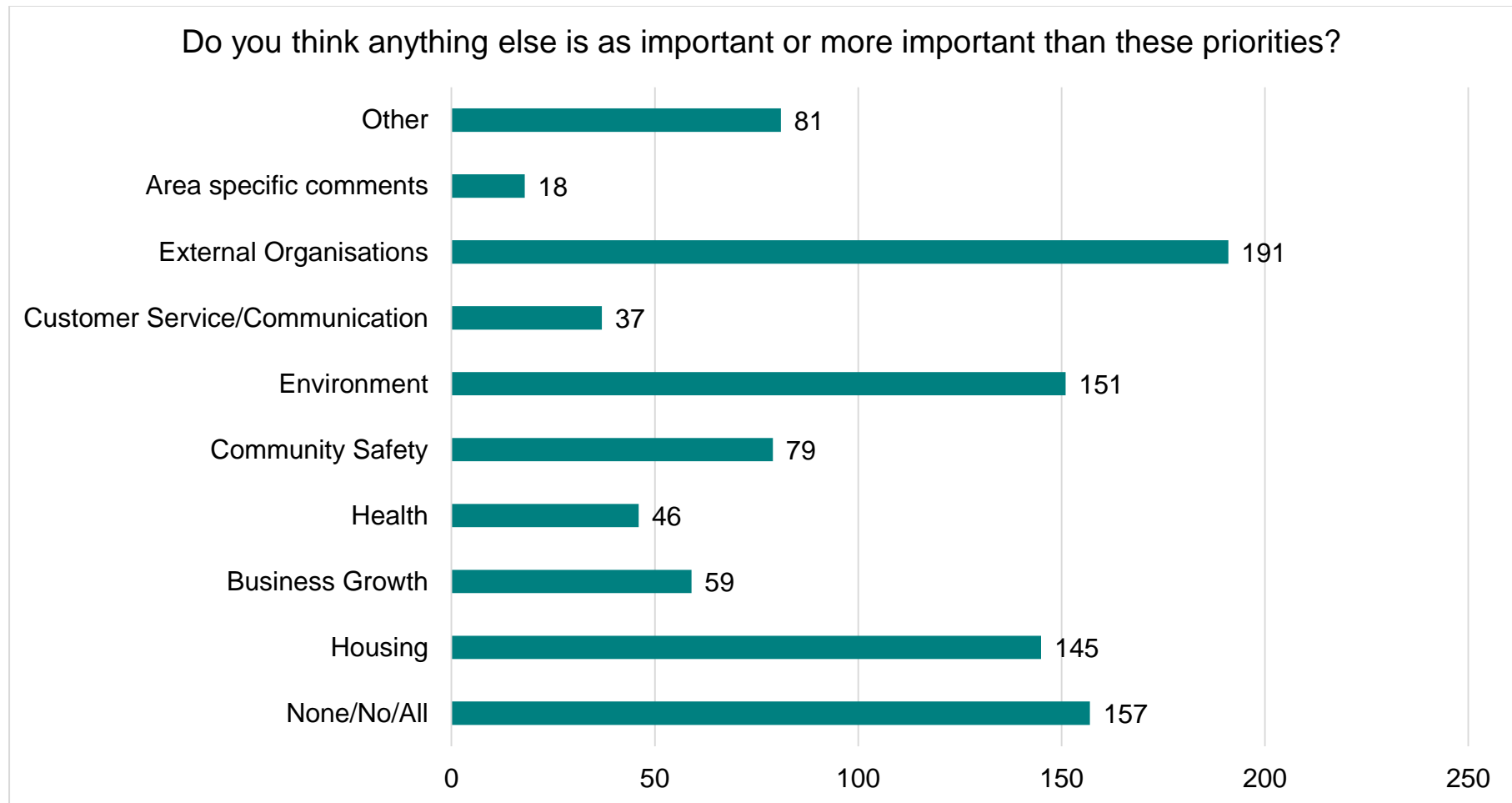

A large proportion of the responses related to items which fall outside of the Council's remit, such as roads, public transport provision, and policing.

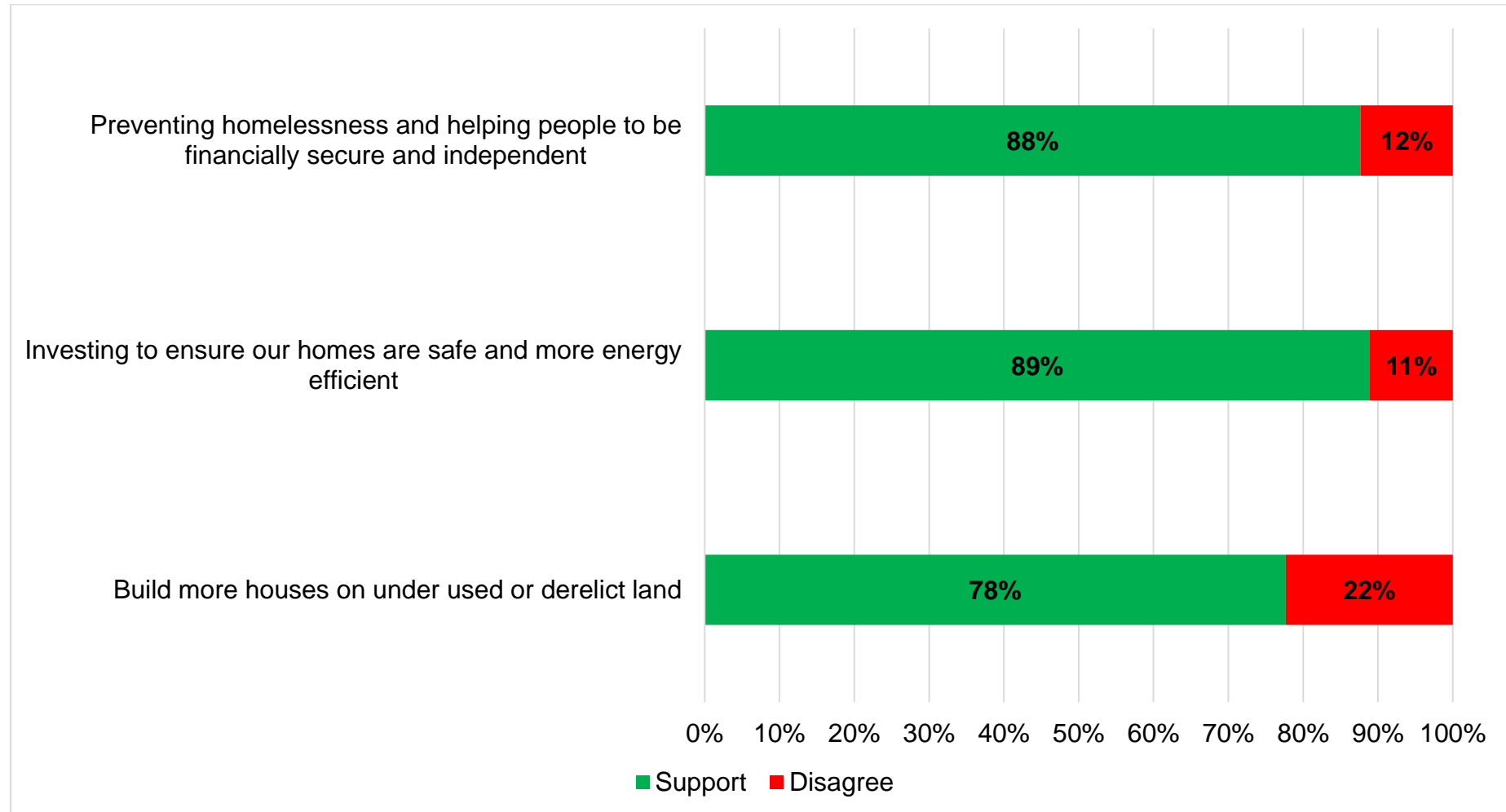
Common themes in the responses were:

- Need for a greater variety of shops

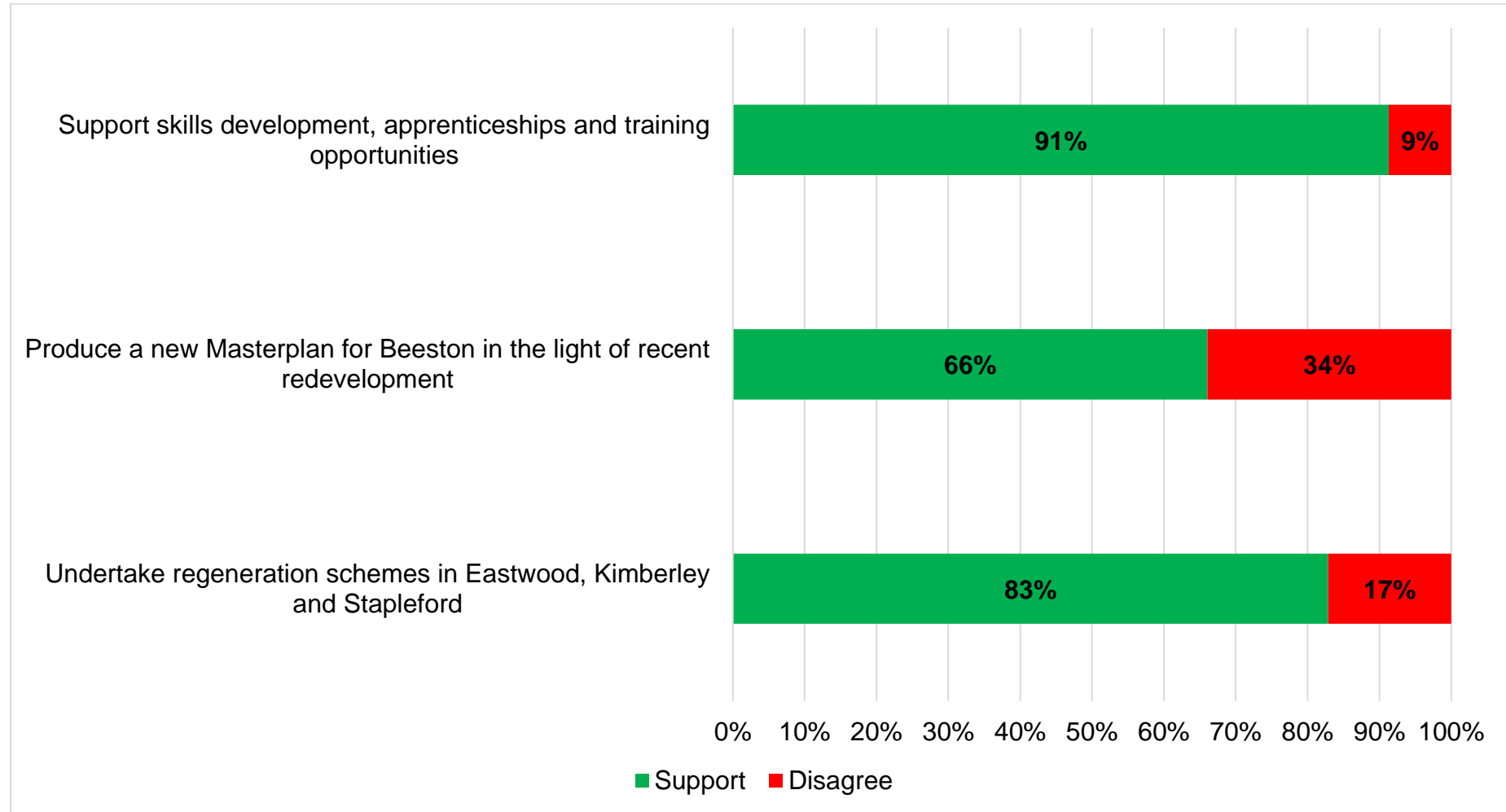

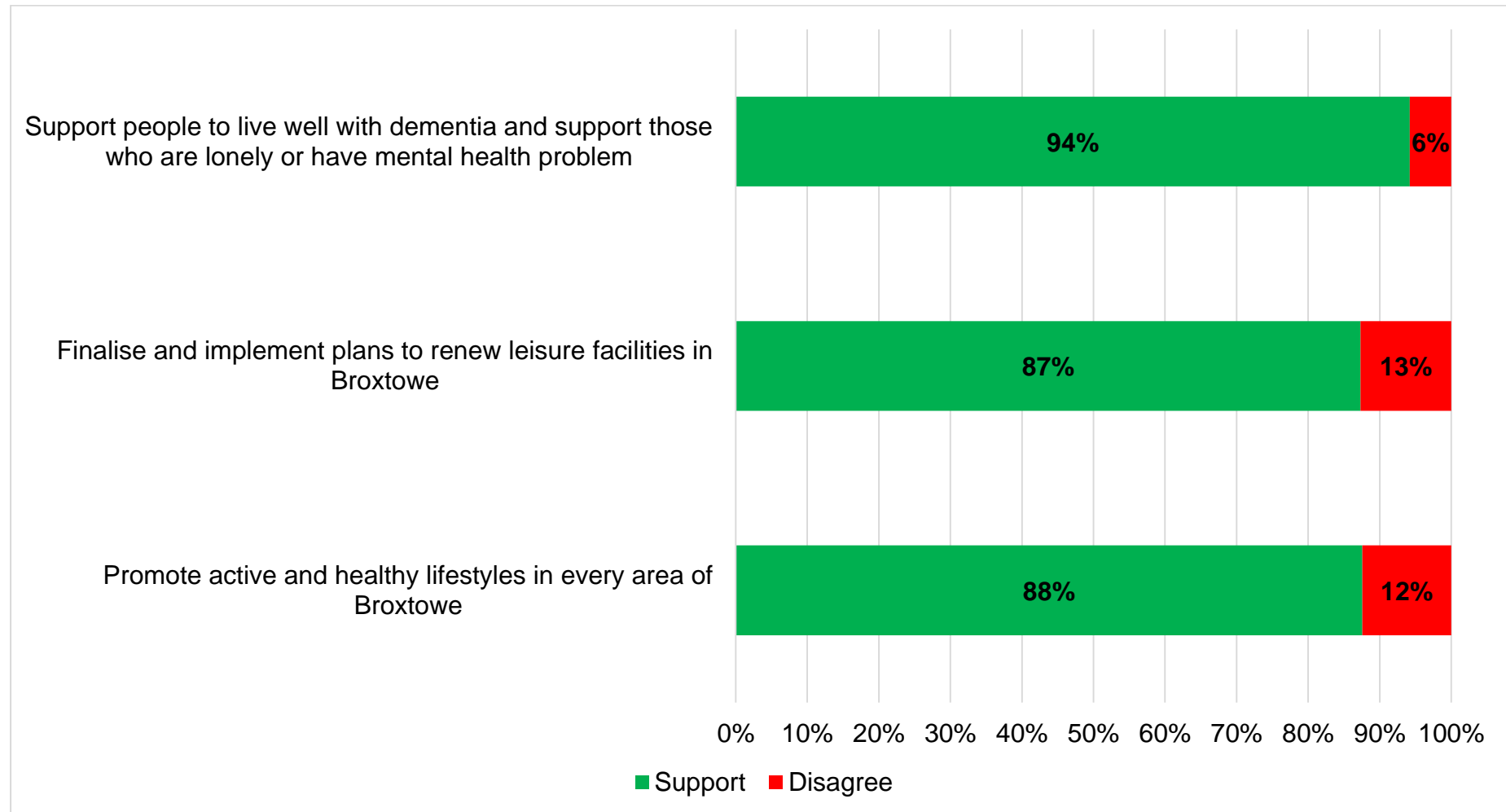

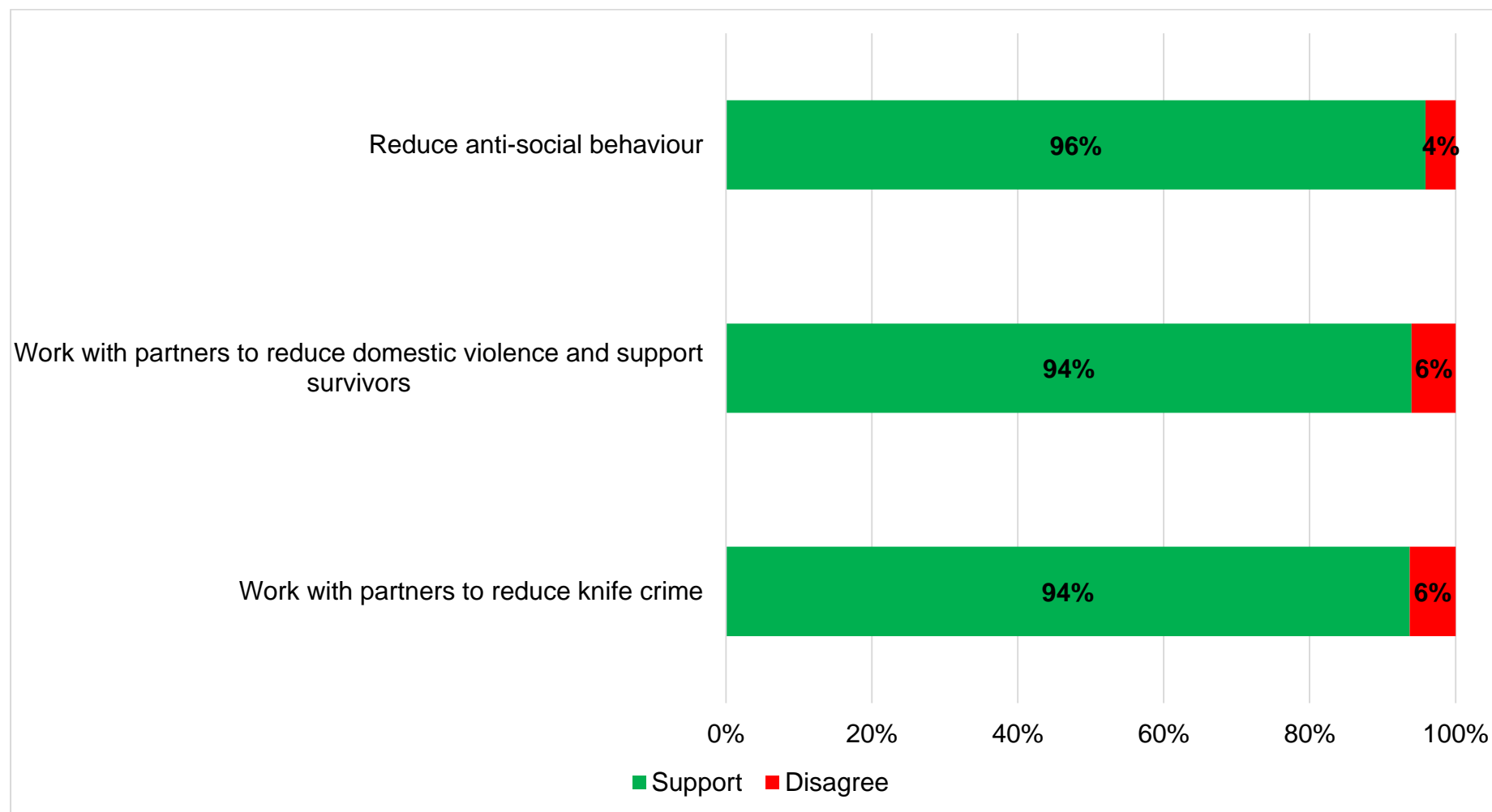
Business Growth



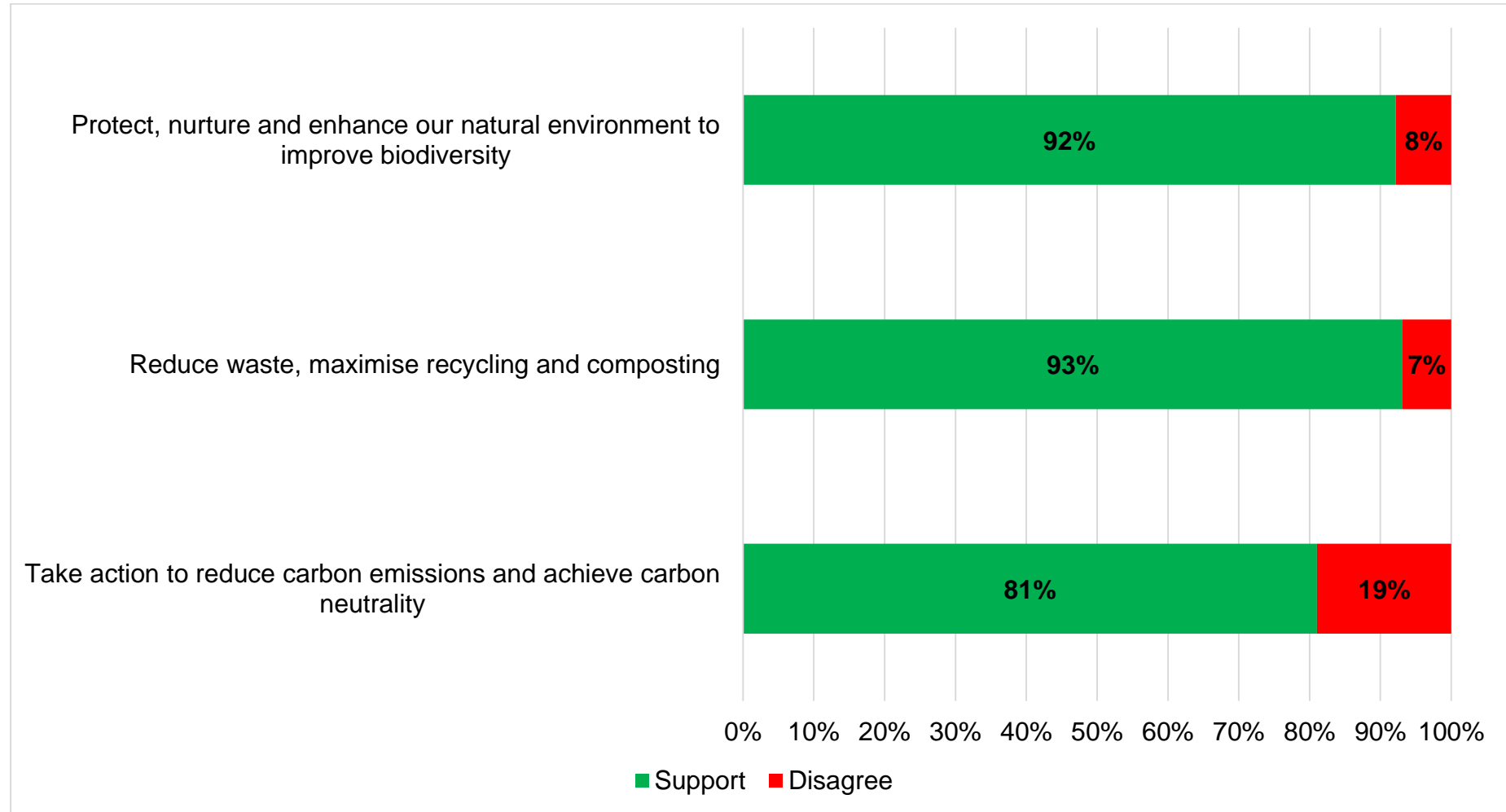

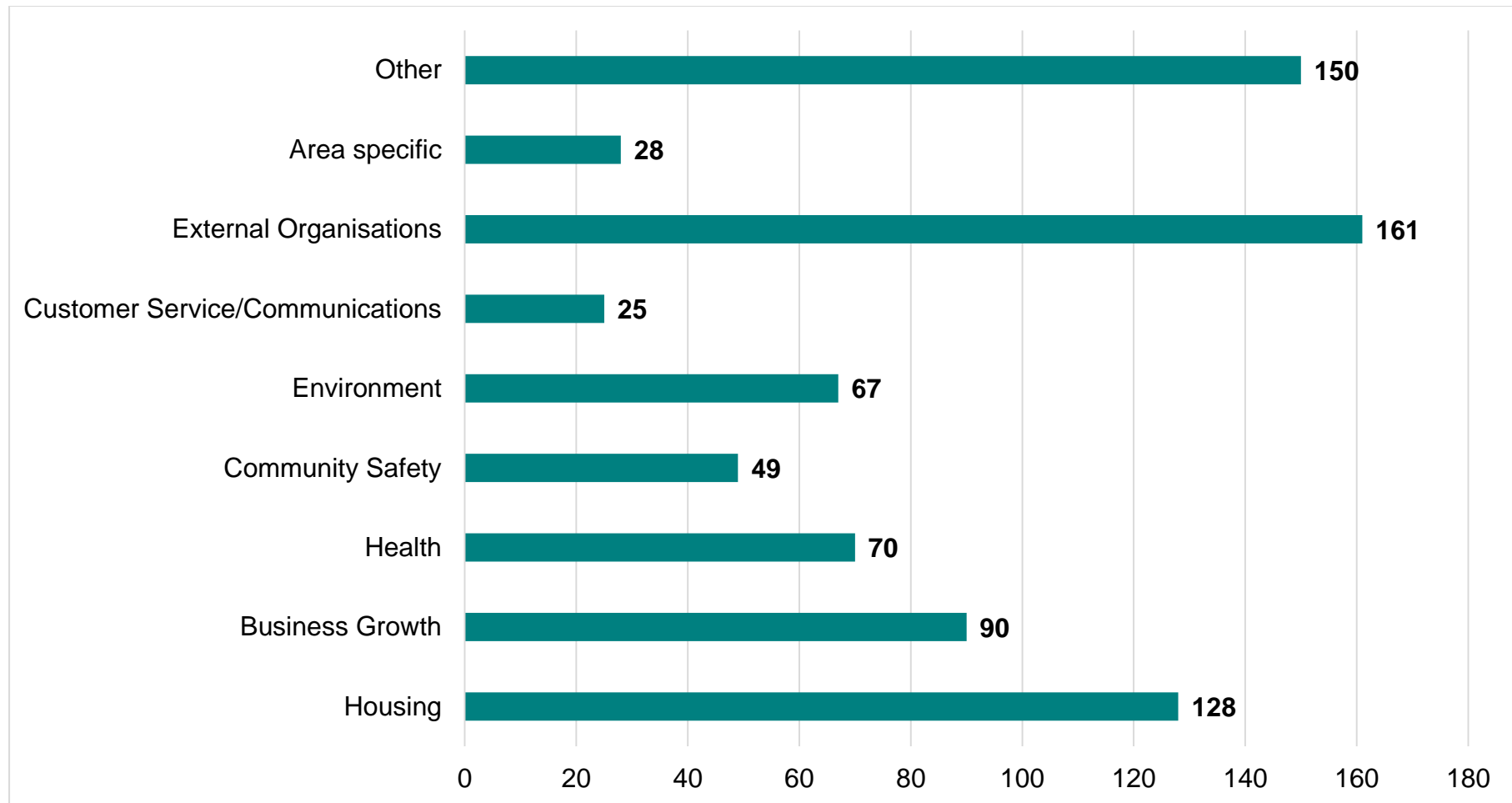

Insights included:

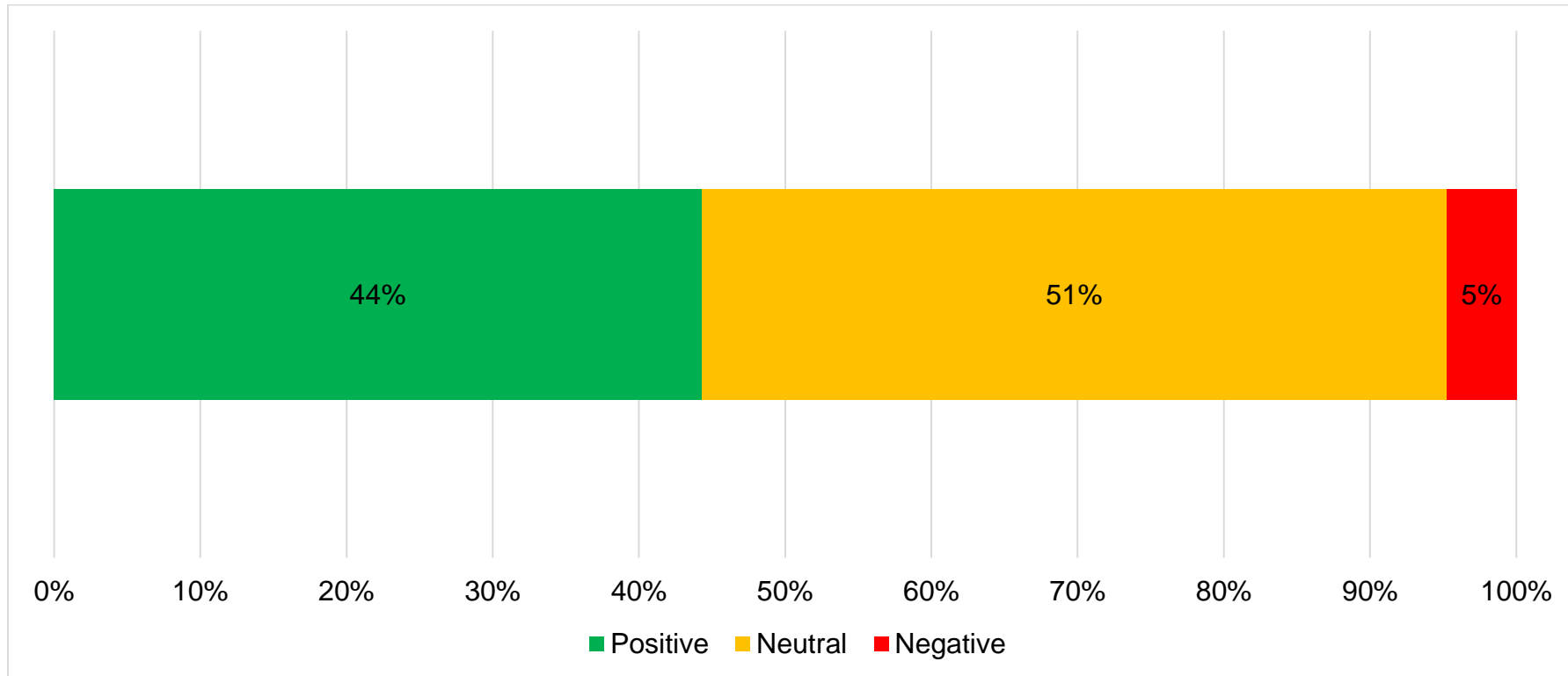
A large proportion of the responses related to items which fall outside of the Council's remit, particularly policing.

- More transparency on Council spending
- Concerns about flood risk
- Concerns about planning, particularly focused on the green belt and having enough facilities to be able to handle the increased population
- A desire for a greater sense of community with suggestions for events, groups and projects to bring people together.

Insights included:

- The main positive examples given were environmental initiatives likes free trees, wild flowers and the management of our parks and open spaces. Regeneration schemes like the Arc Cinema and community events were also mentioned, as well as the cleanliness of the Borough and bin collection teams.
- The main negative examples related to housing and Council Tax.

If the Council could do one thing to make a difference to you, what would it be?

Insights included:

Residents again primarily reiterated the points they made in previous questions.

Common responses focused on:

- A want to be listened to by the Council.
- Discussion of free parking and improved flow of traffic.
- Concerns about planning, particularly focused on the green belt and having enough facilities to be able to handle the increased population
- Concerns about flooding

Public Roadshows

Six public roadshows took place in June to give residents a chance to meet new Members and Senior Officers, hear about the Council's plans and ask any questions.

In order to reach a wider variety of people, the times that the events took place were varied so that there was one morning session, one afternoon session and one evening session each in the north and south of the Borough.

The roadshows were attended by a total of 97 people. This is 62% higher than in 2019.

34 specific comments and questions were received at the events

Insights included:

- Planning was a topic commonly brought up by residents, particularly at the roadshow event in Beeston in Chilwell in relation to a specific application.
- Residents asked questions about regeneration schemes at the Stapleford event.
- Residents also asked for support to improve the appearance of their businesses, particular at the event in Kimberley.
- The main topics in Eastwood were a Council tenant issue, Independent Living, Anti-social behaviour and investment in Eastwood.

Residents appreciated the opportunity to speak to the Chief Executive and other Senior Officers face to face.

Employee Feedback

To engage employees on the Council's plans, many of whom are also Borough residents, four employee events took place.

These were conducted in a variety of ways to support employees with different access needs.

Feedback about the events was positive, with Employees appreciating the opportunity to speak to GMT.

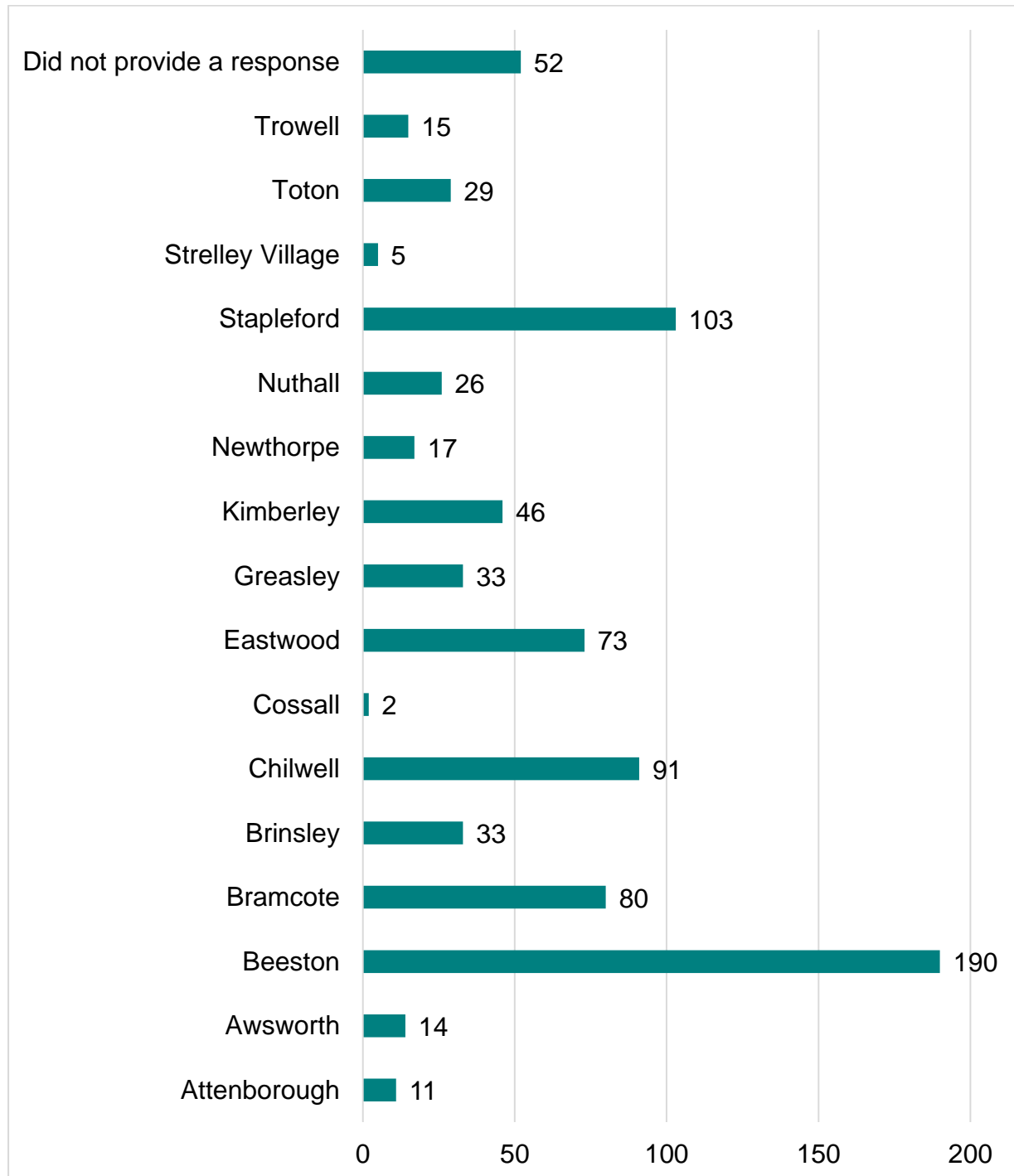

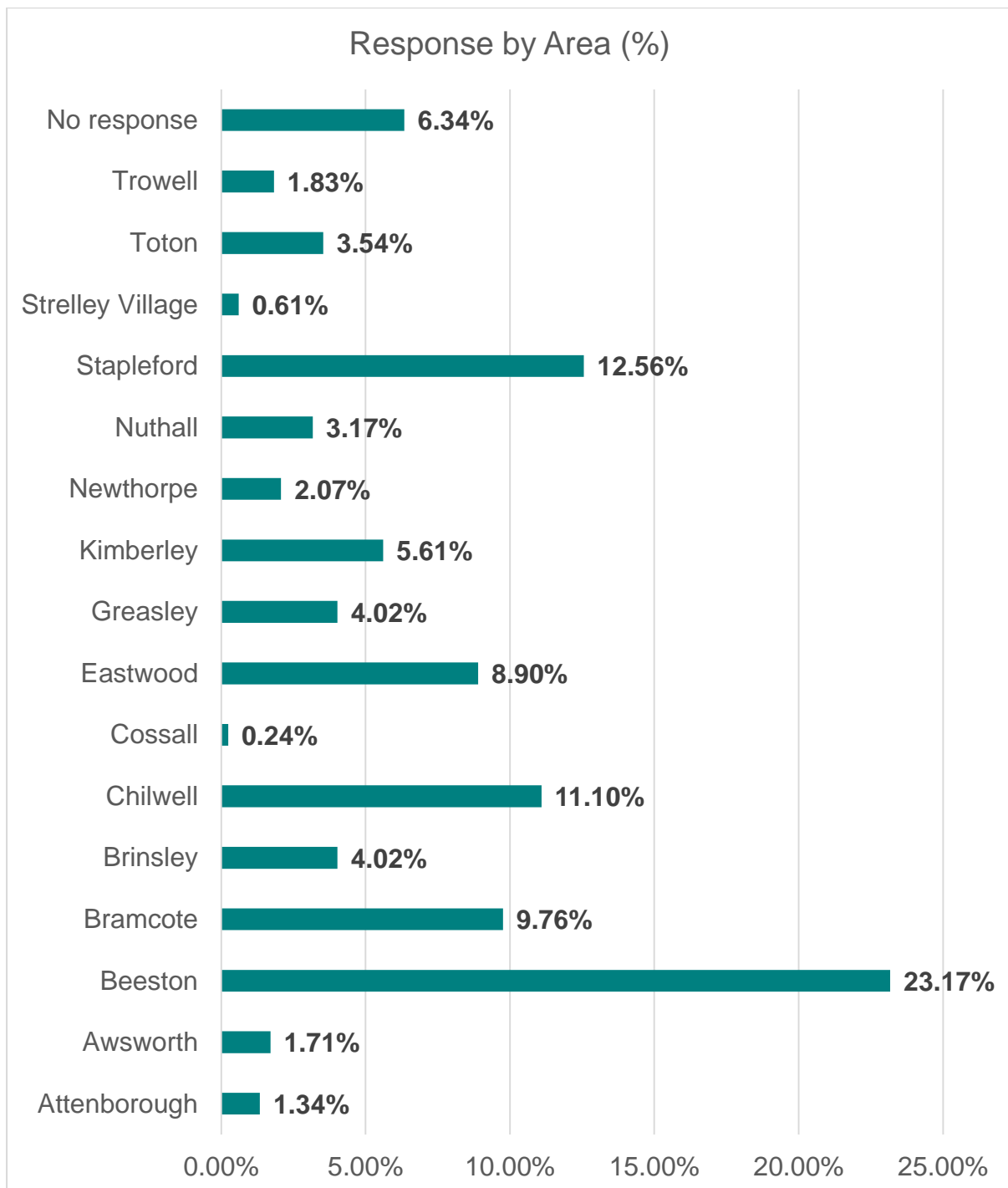

Recommendations for Future Consultations

Survey Questions

- It was felt that some of the questions could be worded differently. For example, 'Have we done something positive over the last few years which has helped make a difference to you? Please explain.' could have been phrased as 'Over the last few years we did xyz, how has this helped make a difference to you? Please explain,' in order to provide more guidance for residents.
- A separate survey document may be required for employees as some who do not live in the Borough felt they could not answer all the questions.
- Support employees to complete the survey at the depot.

Public Roadshow Events

- A banner to advertise the event at the venue which was suitable to go outside.
- More of a briefing for Members about what was expected of them at the sessions.
- More horizon scanning with Senior Officers to predict likely questions by area so that responses could be prepared.
- Small number of large print surveys.
- Invite more Officers to support enquiries e.g. Heads of Service linked to the main priorities.
- Clearly identifiable name badges for Officers and Members in attendance.

Appendix 1 – Communications activity performance

Page views

Our press release titled ‘Dear residents, Let’s Talk Broxtowe’ was our primary page for this campaign. The page received 226 views.

Email bulletin data

Content appeared in 17 email bulletins via the Email Me Service. This reached 172,307 recipients and had 117,193 opens and 2,029 clicks in total.

Information about the consultation appeared in 5 employee briefings, with 3,742 opens and 15 clicks in total.

Social media data

26 Facebook posts were shared reaching 26,170 people. There were 546 total engagements, 91 reactions, 81 shares, 18 comments and 76 link clicks.

12 Twitter posts were shared reaching 9,629 people. There were 189 total engagements, 21 reactions, 31 retweets, 9 comments and 68 link clicks.

7 Facebook advertisements were posted reaching 27,565 people. There were 1,976 total engagements, 40 reactions, 15 shares, 11 comments and 1,904 link clicks.

Stakeholder groups

145 stakeholder groups were contacted, asking them to complete the survey and share in their networks. This included a variety of schools and churches from across Broxtowe, the Borough’s Town and Parish Councils, Beeston Muslim Centre, Stapleford Carers’ Support Group, Sri Thurkkai Amman Temple, Eastwood Volunteer Bureau and The Rectory in Kimberley, to name a few.

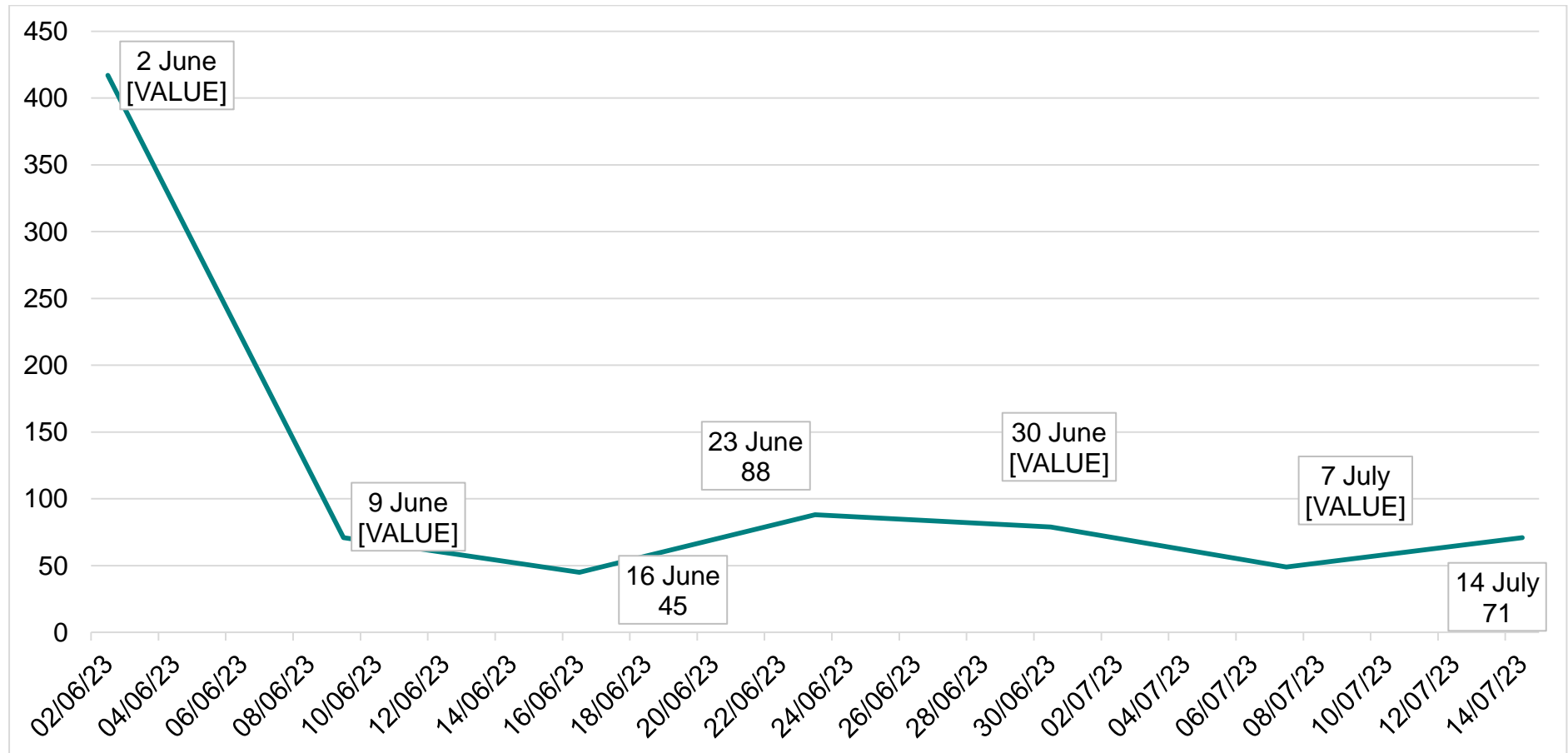
Posters

Do you think anything else is as important or more important than these priorities? Please explain

Housing

- Housing because rent prices are absurd and demand so high. The second, because in order for the neighborhood to thrive we need a varied offer of businesses.
- Less HMO's and student accommodation. Let them go elsewhere. Beeston is being ruined I believe.
- More family housing
- improving existing stock of homes, preventing student landlords moving further out to areas on edge of controlled areas, limiting the number of high rise, multi occupancy student buildings as being seen in Beeston currently, encouraging the University to provide more on campus accommodation, helping first time buyers and renters being pushed out of the market, clamping down on the parking issues caused by inconsiderate parking on corners, yellow lines etc
- An integrated approach to land use planning and demanding high quality standards from new housing developments is urgently needed. Broxtowe needs to reduce its self imposed housing target ASAP to something reasonable and achievable.
- The way you spend our money , housing illegal immigrants for a start and prioritising them over established uk people
- I think new housing is being covered appropriately already in the area.
- Better safe council house that don't have mould and damp.. that won't make our kids ill
- The issue of student accomodation in Beeston is very important. Things are becoming critical. A good balance between students and residents in any street is so important. The council needs to have a real focus on this. Strict enforcement of controls over the conversion of homes into HMOs - Article Four direction, liaison with the University, etc.
- I think more affordable housing should be built so people are able to get on the housing ladder. Not holding association housing.
- Reduce planning approvals for HMOs
- We need to stop building flats everywhere. Let's keep Beeston a nice place to live - not an overcrowded town.
- Building should be focused on social housing both in the towns and also in rural areas as the lack of affordable homes is a big issue.
- Housing . Using the good quality housing stock for families and supporting the development of low rise student accommodation.
- Pay attention to the growing problem of HMO's in Beeston & Chilwell
- Tackling cost of living crisis and supporting families, supplementing housing benefit element of universal credit which has no correlation to rents in Broxtowe, increasing council tax stock

- The rise in student accommodation in Beeston is changing Beeston dramatically, and not for the better. Families are struggling to get affordable homes, as the housing stock is taken more and more with HMO's.
- More important is to stop the planning board approving more homes being massively enlarged and used as student housing, or retroactively approving them. Secondly ban forever the huge "Cassidy" development in Beeston town centre, unless they reduce the height to max 4/5 floors and add appropriate design elements.
- drug dealers living in bungalows that an elderly person could/ should live in
- Not sure we need more new homes but we need to tackle homeless and rent issues.
- Yes older residents who don't live in housing shelter

Being elderly and disabled and all 3 residents where I live are all over 70 and I know that seeing a Police presence would make me feel safe as when I moved here over 21 years ago we did see a Police officer patrolling our directs.

- More youth services
- It would be nice to see more police officers on the street
- Albeit outside your responsibilities the lack of visible policing is concerning.
- I do want Community Safety but again, we pay a police precept as part of our community charge and therefore I believe it is their responsibility and not the councils to fight crime.

- To put actions in place to reduce anti social behaviour within young teenagers as this is going to become a bigger problem as they get older.
- Antisocial behaviour with younger people, 11-16 age range. A lot of boys (mainly) within this age range throughout Chilwell and Beeston that show disrespectful / antisocial behaviour. If this is not tackled now, they could become criminals in the years to come.
- Community safety and tackling anti social behaviour should be top priority
- Tackling antisocial behaviour
- Far more Bobby's on the Beat.
- I would prefer more police presence
- Making a safe welcome area for teenagers local to Eastwood that does not have bullies
- I think community safety is a top priority in Broxtowe, especially in Eastwood and Stapleford where some pubs are reported to be 'drug selling Den's', which the police know about, and yet nothing is done.
- Policing in general should be improved. The drug problem in Eastwood is well known.
- I thought crime and policing is the responsibility of the County Council and we have a Crime & Police Commissioner who should tackle these issues.
- In with the Community Safety, it would be good to see an increased Police presence from time to time.

Get a grip on the grounds team, awful planters in town centres, no aspiration, they sit in the vans all day. Get the Chief exec out the office and look at the borough compared to Erewash and other areas.
- Parks should be highly maintained to many areas are being left to grow long parks and open spaces are not the place for this, the useable recreational area is being decreased on many sites the long unmown areas become litter traps and dog toilets and increase weed seeds which spread into pavements and private gardens adding to maintenance for the council and home owners.
- More frequent black bin collections 4 bins between 8 flats emptied every two weeks ridiculous
- Street cleaning. A tidy place makes for a better environment to live in
- Preserving the green spaces we have by using more brown sites for building
- Opening up and improving more green spaces for people and wildlife such as Bramcote Golf Course, Bramcote Ridge. Resist the pressure to build housing on these spaces and aim to create green corridors and spaces to to improve mental health, wildlife and plant diversity, better management of water by avoiding paving and surface run off and managing urban temperatures better through greater masses of trees and vegetation.
- My 5 year old Minnie went litter picking with a friend who had litter pickers in Manchester. I'd never thought about it as a kids activity but they loved it and it is helping. My friends had a completely different perspective than I would have had before in litter picking

- I live in Eastwood, and on the whole are satisfied with what the Council does, on visiting parks in the area , when I am able I have found they are mostly well kept, however before I lived here I had been visiting for many years, and thought what a lovely place it was, however the litter is atrocious at times. Why it is like this now is at times baffling, I do wonder if the litter problem, could be helped with more bins, especially on the high street.
- Whilst supporting housing development on brownfield sites, we must protect our greenfield spaces and make more use of them for local recreation and sport for all, particularly supporting and making use of local volunteers. The mountain bike trails at Stapleford Hill are a great example, where a little bit more council support (such as signage and bins) could eliminate some of the

frictions and to make the space an even greater resource for local people to keep active through popular and accessible sports (noting it's not just young people that use these, there are many older local people that really value this too).

- having better technology for staff - pens and paper on visits are not good for the environment and has multiple issues
- Climate, improving our local environment, improving air quality
- Environment is also a huge priority
- Environment stick to getting the bins emptied
- I think Environmental Health is also important
- Recycling collection is very poor, food recycling, recycling glass bins (rather than the bags which blow away when empty) should be available. Garden

waste bins should be available for free. Soft plastic waste should also be collected.

- these would be my main priorities from the list above but also feel parks and open space is a priority as helps with mental health

- Rubbish being dumped at garages between Melbourne Rd and Arran close wardens to check
- Conservation, green spaces, wildlife, and wait for it...litter!!!!!! These can all affect the other priorities and the litter issue is disgraceful...some/most areas of Broxtowe are 'let down' by the amount of kerbside and business area litter accumulation. It makes us look and feel 'low level' in my opinion.
- Active travel. Because of the environment, obesity crisis, mental health, traffic congestion and other issues.

- The council needs to think about our biodiversity and our wildlife. Stop cutting verges, plant more wildflowers, stop building houses on green belt, work with farmers to help wildlife, work with builders on new houses to ensure they're wildlife friendly i.e. for hedgehogs. More ponds for wildlife x not enough wildflower meadows,
- I disagree with the money spent on green reducing carbon emissions. There is no proven scientific basis for this.

- Our younger generation depend on our open spaces when the weather is suitable, Queen Elizabeth park has so much more potential for an extended age varied play park and including more picnic benches would be ideal, especially when Fairfield school is directly opposite this park has heavy usage and would majorly benefit from a refit and refresh, children's sports days are also held here so picnic benches or more benches would be helpful for visitors or parents. This park has several entrances/exits and cover a vast majority of a section to Stapleford and seems to be overlooked.
- Get rid of all the litter and enforce fines on those who litter. Fine dog owners who do not control their dogs in parks etc and do not pick up their mess.
- You say invest in open spaces so are planning to ruin and build on Hickings Lane park, council are not listening to local residents about this. Keep all the green space, grass areas and don't build on it or allow G3 football pitches to be built
- Environment: I would really like to see an organised composting/food waste program. I also don't understand why yard waste is a paid program, when everyone should be participating in it to make our community greener and more environmentally strong.
- Re environment, liaise with outsourced contractors more to ensure they don't cut hedges and hedgerows in growing seasons. More wild verges left where safe to do so, more pollinating plants in parks, encourage young people to "own" and love their environment.

- Parks and open spaces. It is important to target areas where people do not have access to the green environment. It is also desperately important to add hedgerows and more trees to support our biodiversity as well as improve air quality. This in turn will help the health of all. Parks and open spaces can also help act as nature corridors acting as a safety lifeline for our wildlife that is being so underrepresented. Add wild spaces and safe areas away from dogs. Stop using pesticides and encourage wildlife to live again in Broxtowe. By prioritising green spaces it will also dramatically help with everybody's health and well being.-Covid highlighted this very clearly.
- We need to retain, maintain, and increase biodiversity within Broxtowe. This means making the most of abandoned areas and turning it into green areas.
- Prioritise work toward sustainable energy would be nice - let's start with better subsidies for replacing gas boilers for air source heat pumps. You could start by doing your own buildings so that you learn the process and benefits. Also maybe a large battery store coupled with a solar farm.
- So football in Broxtowe parks is always prioritised over cricket. Hickings Lane Park won't have a cricket pitch once the new football facilities have been built. In Toton Manor Park the cricket team maintains the cricket square but the young football teams practice on the outfield most nights of the week. Last Summer the outfield was practically bare from so much use while the football pitches were not being used at all. I wrote to some councillors to request that a sign be put to request that footballers don't practice on the cricket pitch between May and September but despite positive responses nothing happened.
- More green spaces. Contributing to biodiversity even in built up areas. eg. planting more pollinators and creating spaces for residents (even in small spaces)
- Prioritise Green matters over other matters
- Maintain Green belt
- Promote Green spaces, wildlife works and recycling more
- Public Hedge Cutting , and public lawn/ grass maintenance. Your gardening crews no longer edge lawns, no longer, do any weeding on public pavements, no longer cut & shape public hedges, no longer use blowers to clear away footpaths after grass cutting. You used to do this regularly years ago. What has happened to this service??? You already have the equipment to do this, so why don't you do it anymore???
- Keeping open spaces and jetties open
- Control of DOGS in public places including cafes bars and restaurants. Dogs and their owners appear to have more rights than none dog owners. I no longer feel safe in many public places as dogs are not on leads and are free to attack at will for no apparent reason.
- Climate change is the most important issue.
- All the Parks in Stapleford, need to be upgraded, if they haven't already, to include a play area for little ones, a skateboard area for all ages and a

M.U.G.A. where room permits. The children need somewhere to go outside and to do things - our Parks are perfect for that.

- Emptying bins properly.
- Tree and shrub maintenance. Large trees close to houses should be assessed as to their height and suitability when close to housing, with the weather now being unpredictable trees can become unstable when heavily in leaf, during dry spells that are then followed by wet windy weather. Overhanging trees/shrubs obliterating road signs and long grass impeding view at junctions should also be tackled.
- The natural environment
- Traffic on the A52 Beeston/Bramcote at a high level, why not plant trees/ bushes on the central reservation as on so many A roads in the county to improve the environment and carbon emissions. Free trees distributed to households every year surely these could be used and would greatly improve the aesthetics of the road

- A new playground on Eastcote Avenue that is aimed at children aged 0-11. There is nothing for children under about 7 at the moment. (Climbing frames, smaller slides and so on.

- "We have the beautiful Queen Elizabeth park with Tennis courts. That children no longer seem to be able to use. The courts are locked up. This year the grass courts have been marked out. 1 only. Instead of 3! Why?
- This is a public park. The school are using it as a school field for a PE lesson on a regular basis I really haven't got my head around it. We have something good but the courts are not accessible. "
- Make people more aware of global warming and what we can do
- If you decide to for example plant trees why is there in effort put into maintaining them, for example on Archers field there are lots of trees that are being allowed to grow over the paths so that you can no longer get down the paths and there are brambles over growing the paths and the paths are all being eroded away so they can no longer be used by people in wheelchairs.
- Working alongside other councils at all levels to do more to tackle climate change and nature depletion.
- Make Broxtowe an attractive place to live. Currently it is a dishevelled mess in parts.

- Some streets need to be cleaned more often.
- Beautifying Broxtowe, more trees and plant arrangements.
- Street cleaning- particularly making sure gutters and drains are regularly cleared of weeds & debris - especially in the light of recent flooding issues

- Being responsive to individuals when they have an issue that needs discussion. I was talking to a resident on Ilkeston Rd yesterday and he was very dismissive of BBC in relation to cutting down trees that did not warrant remove.
- Communication
- Improve community presence, lots of people do not know/cannot reach their councillors and have no voice.
- Respond to complaints
- contacting and dealing with ANY department at Broxtowe Borough Council can only be described as incompetent, poorly staffed, lack of staff, staff leaving, poor service and wrong information.
- Also the sheer lack of engagement of locally elected councillors with their residents is virtually non-existent. I couldn't even tell you who they are.
- listen too the public more there the paying servant too the community.
- Listen to the public
- Ensure your services are as efficient and responsive as possible - some answers or responses are still slower than pre-covid .This may mean difficult people management decisions but its time all public services returned to top quality levels of performance. Broxtowe has always been a good local authority, please keep it that way.
- Answering the telephones and emails with a prompt response and action.
- Answering the telephone at the council offices
- As a disabled person who struggles with mobility the service and help (or lack of) has been very poor. Can never get through on the phone lines to Broxtowe

council and customer service from the majority I have spoken to has been awful.

- Being able to speak to someone when you have a problem, nobody answers the phone and when you send an email as advised by the answer phone it takes ages to get reply.

Disinterested officers whether they can help or not they are just disinterested is biggest thing taken away from a conversation time and time again .. customer service is more important than any of above as it's those customers who pay council tax pay for services you provide but they don't receive
- Sort your answering of phones out, especially repairs
- Consulting with people before making decisions that will affect their well-being or life style so that they can provide valuable insights into the effects of your decisions before it is too late.
- Please get staff working in the council offices not from home
- "Listen to local community. What are their priorities?
- The Beeston and district civil society consulted the local community about their needs and priorities 2020-2022, they are happy to help. "
- Not being informed of proposed plans for development
- Customer service is important
- Communication from the council to residents
- More face to face contact with officers on the estates
- Getting staff back on the phones so it is easier to speak to a person. Not everyone is on-line and even those of us who are don't always fit into the neatly boxed lists on a web page.

- Public transport needs looking at - the town centre of stapleford is served well but the outskirts aren't - I think we also need to try and get Stapleford on the Robin Hood Network as the cost of using public transport is expensive and being on the Robin Hood Network would help people get to work and save a bit of money
- mending the roads
- Make better use of the tram interchange and no new roads.
- The above are very important but larkfield road definitely need speed bumps. Being disabled being blocked in or out with cars blocking my drive at school drop off and pick ups is not good. But not allowed no parking restrictions .
- Road maintenance ought to be top priority there are too many pot holes they are in a shocking state of repair.
- Reduce the cost of council tax which currently represent very poor value for money.
- Our biggest concern is the state of the roads and speeding motorists in residential area.
- and get some potholes filled in the road outside me has more holes than a golf course .
- Improving the recycling would be great as I currently have to drive from NG9 8PH to Beeston to recycle tetrapaks, not good for the environment!
- Thye state of the roads is abysmal. Pot holes need mending and roads need resurfacing.
- "Road infrastructure, keeping roads in good repair is essential as well as the above. Including pot holes and road maintenance, and keeping pavements and verges in good condition by removing weeds and trimming overgrown areas.
- Some of the pavements are quite dangerous, and the roads not much better
- Highways/potholes causing damage to cars. An uphill battle I know, but essential to keep our roads safe to use.
- The condition of rods and pavements in the area is poor and needs attention
- I think they should bring a bus service to cover Linwood Cres pensioners like there used to be

- Road surface maintenance.
- Pot holes and the roads needs to be a major priority. The holes are a serious risk to life and limb. My husband broke his neck last year due to a pothole. 9(not in Broxtowe but in a borough where the roads are better than here).
- Lack of an adequate bus service for people living on the outer edges of Eastwood, i.e. Brookhill Leys Road. to get up or down the hill to Eastwood town Centre, three buses a day and none on Sunday is not enough, when you are in your eighties and disabled.
- "Repairing the roads which are appalling with potholes
- Stop spending money on mini markets and forming useless committees to do so
- Stop acting as a cavalry at Council meetings whereby decisions have already been made behind the scenes along political lines
- Improve planning decisions in relation to the wishes of residents. Stop children's homes for adults being run by inappropriate foreign businessmen. Be sceptical when directors have changed indicating the company is nearly bust. I do not want drug dealing adult supervision of these people on my estate bringing down the value of houses when I have paid a lot for my house and worked hard all my life
- Stop giving away money to people who don't work when their plight is their own fault and my council tax increases.
- Resist Broxtowe going into the City to increase their council tax payers when the city council is led by financially inadequate people who squander money
- Get the Planning department to follow up their actions with people who ruin the environment
- Crack down on people who start to build and then approach the council for planning permission. The Asian community have a habit of doing this Avoid a planning decision being made by an Asian planner for an Asian planning application. Make sure it is reviewed by more than one community
- The pavements in Eastwood are appalling"
- Footpaths in Broxtowe are a disgrace
- Better traffic management on Chewton St eg speed humps for speeding motorists a nuisance especially as there are schools on there.
- The roads in Eastwood are in a horrible condition. Old Derby Road is full of potholes since the big businesses lorries (Warbuttons, Greene King, Royal Mail, etc) are using it regularly day and night. Often these lorries stop right on the residential roads for rest and filling in their paperwork before proceeding to their destinations. There should be restrictions for these to stop on the residential roads. The businesses involved in this should pay for the repair of Old Derby Road as the lorries create constant damage to it.

- Broxtowe BC must consider their role in education provision as a LPA. It has worked with the County Council to reduce school places in South Broxtowe to release land for housing development. You cannot have sustainable development with social infrastructure. South Broxtowe residents now find their young people with further to travel to get to over capacity schools. Even then there is to be a shortfall in secondary school places in the immediate future.

- Parking and ratruns to cut travelling through Beeston. People parking outside our homes and getting tram. Parking permits please, free for residents for first car
- get all the pot holes filled properly,
- The roads in Stapleford are full of pot holes and need urgent repair.
- They damage cars and look unsightly.
- Roads (infrastructure) - require massive investment, but stop filling holes as it's making things worse
- No one who works in Nottingham, Derby or the towns in between can use public transport to get to work. We have one bus an hour which goes to Ilkeston or Kimberley; Broxtowe are therefor ensuring that for this village car ownership is a prerequisite.
- To get a better bus service around Central avenue area. The older people either have to get to Woodside Road or walk into beeston.

- Our 21 bus service has been stopped and the 15 cut after 7pm making it very difficult to get into Nottingham ! But over 400 new houses being built in Stapleford and were supposed to cut back on emissions.

- Our roads, streets and footpaths are not well maintained. When potholes are repaired they don't last long before needing repair again. The edges of roads and footpaths have weeds that are not treated/removed making the place we live look not cared for and encouraging people to litter. The foot paths

(particularly in Chilwell) are very uneven with many broken slabs causing trip hazards - in an age where we are encouraged to be more sustainable by walking rather than take the car or walking for leisure/fitness this is rather poor and needs addressing as a matter of urgency.

- Commute frequency needs to be increase for buses. It is tough to travel during non pick hours using public transportation
- Road safety - Traffic often travels too fast through Kimberley and we need more safe places to cross the road from Nottingham Road to Gilthill Speed Cameras instead of speed indicators. Kimberley is a town and Nuthall is a village so why does Nuthall have Traffic Lights, Pedestrian Crossings with lights and the town of Kimberley have neither - not even a crossing by Gilthill School, Nine Corners, Hall Om Wong or Noel Street for children going to the Academy, Primary Schools, Playgroups or Nurseries besides people going to bus stops, Uniformed organisations or Churches etc. How can parents teach children to cross the road safely when there is no where safe to cross. There have been fatal and serious accidents in the past and many lucky escapes yet no extra safe places to cross! This is a priority for Kimberley especially with the new housing, more people and more traffic! Keeping people safe on the roads when needing to cross should be a priority! Many cars park on the street on Eastwood Road and Nottingham Road which make crossing the road more hazardous. Many cars and motor bikes exceed 30mph on Main Street especially at Nine Corners, a blind spot.
- Better rural transport
- "Transport from wollaton to Beeston .
- Wollaton... those of us in Broxtowe borough
- postcode ... are no longer able to get to Beeston unless travelling by bus on two days only my and on these days this is a very restricted bus service - making it difficult to get sufficient time in Beeston to shop, meet friends etc.

- Lack of daily regular transport to Beeston means those without cars are disadvantaged and more at a risk of loneliness especially in the winter months when they miay wish to get to foodbanks , warm banks, etc. furthermore they are unable to make use of The nearest cinema and silver screen at the Arc cinema due ti adequate bus times. So again something that could combat loneliness is made difficult to access for those with out or unable to use cars. "
- I would like for grassed verges and landscaping to be cut more frequently. Leaving them to grow to knee high, then chopping them back, leaving the cut grass in situ means they constantly look a mess.

- Yet places around Stapleford seems to be in a better state
- I have noticed I think we have had a Conservative run council which as per usual they look after affluent areas."
- Stapleford has no police station, no shops. It's disgusting.
- I am a Newthorpe resident. I feel that the Eastwood area is somewhat neglected of all the towns in Broxtowe. The weekly newsletter reports on activities and events in Stapleford, Beeston and Kimberley for example with little going on in Eastwood. We did not get any government money for levelling up! Was enough effort put into the bid? When is the Walker Street site to be developed for the benefit of the community?!
- Giving help to Eastwood for a change
- sorting out a proper post office and bank in Stapleford town centre
- I don't see the same issues in other parts of Broxtowe, like Beeston.... , why isn't the council doing something to make Stapleford as nice as other areas?
- Awsworth seems to be forgotten yet again.
- Beeston Ryland's is often forgotten. We have issues with camper vans parked up along Canalside and parking issues but nobody is interested
- You want a town to thrive and yet you let the banks close and post offices and close the hubs of the community like the pubs and town halls. Eastwood has been suffering from these sorts of things and yet they say it is being invested in. Where? The health clinic has been condemned and boarded up for yhears. There is supposedly going to be a new health centre and fire station behind the library which has had planning permission for 2 years butt no action taken. The current fire station is not fit fror purpose as it is made from asbestos. Shops are constantly boarded up and empty. The headstocks conservation area is fenced off and had nothing done to it for a year (aside from cementing in a new bench in front of it. Which says to me its going to be that way for a while) zand yet it is a massively popular area for many many people. A lot of 'friends of the headstocks group' even plant wildflowers a nd sow extra seeds up there to make it more pleasant for visitors, but it is just a mess. Another

park which has been let go into hall park. There is often broken glass around the skate area, empty beer cans strewn around and sometimes evidence of drug use. It needs TLC and more benches for the elderly and disabled visitors, of which there are quite a few from the local estate. Also the bridlepath running behind eastwood cricket ground badly needs resurfacing, there are huge pot holes all along it. It is very dangerous for many of the local residents, I have seen two elderly dog walkers take a tumble due to the very poor condition. This is a massive shame as it is a lovely walk that connects all the way along to colliers wood. There are many ex miners in the area and love the heritage but it is not looked after and made enough of.

- Despite my answers above I do agree with the priorities set out but being a resident of Eastwood someone (other than Milan!) needs to realise, & act on the fact, that Eastwood, & not just Beeston & Stapleford, are also supposed to be part of Broxtowe !!
- Clean Stapleford up, an old type street cleaner might help

This was done the last 2 springs, meaning that the plants that were already growing were cleared and in both years the new plants did not grow anything like as well as in the first year of the experiment because of lack of rain after the clearance.
- From your pictures of at least one other area you have achieved much greater success from mowing in the autumn only. "
- Make a lot more use of the green spaces we have, don't plan to build on them and push them further away. Maintain what we have a lot better.
- A plastics recycling site (used to be one at Sainsburys...I do know we should reduce as well)
- Keeping the town's tidy-street planters, road sweeping, weed and grass management

Brinsley

- It all went fine but there were no glasses at the venue to serve the drinks in. Luckily they had some plastic cups we were able to borrow. Arrangements will need to be clearer going forward.
- Check in with a checklist for relevant employees before each event.

Chilwell

- Peter who Chairs the Independent Remuneration Panel was there and had a suggestion that we should look to recruit some new members. He commented that the membership is currently of a particular age group who may not be able to support the panel for much longer in the future. He also said that the freemen and aldermen would be a good resource from their experience in the community.
- Inham Nook Wildflowers not as good as previous year
- Build more housing
- No e-scooter trials in Beeston
- Housing provision for the elderly – have care home and dementia bungalows but need easily accessible homes for older people before we get to this stage
- Student housing – need a clearer policy about the purpose for building student houses, where they are and how much
- Flat about coop in Beeston, top of lace maker – children gathering, possibly drugs.
- In relation to the Chetwynd development, specifically Pentryn Crescent – lack of communication between the Council, the neighbourhood forum and residents. For example, the neighbourhood forum told residents to attend the Beeston and Chilwell Let's Talk Broxtowe events to discuss this issue but the Council was not aware of that so was not able to organise a Planning Officer presence.
- The Councillors that attended were Pauline Smith, Helen Skinner, Colin Tideswell, Helen Faccio and Stephen Jeremiah

Eastwood

- Most came as a couple so the three main topics were a Council tenant issue, Independent Living, Anti-social behaviour and investment in Eastwood.
- Feedback from the event would be that it was a bit of a pain access wise as there is no on street parking or on site so made it more difficult to get everything in ready for setting up on my own.
- We could have done with something outside to let people know we were there.
- The Councillors themselves didn't particularly understand what it was about two were existing ones who don't really pick up on our emails and other communications a lot of the time so may be something to consider for future.

Stapleford

- People didn't know the venue by its name, only its colloquial name of 'the youth club', so this led to some confusion and some people going to the wrong place/around the back.
- Darren Henry turned up and stayed the whole time, he spoke to every resident.
- Sue Paterson, Richard MacRae, Ross Bofinger, and Hannah Land attended – they were impressive and spoke to everyone
- Sue, Ross and Richard took more surveys away with them for their groups.
- People were slightly confused by what the roadshow was, one lady had already completed the survey but didn't realise we had more today
- Three town councillors came
- Almost no-one had the cakes but the drinks were popular
- Would have been handy to have Economic Development officers there
- Next time it would be good to have some large print surveys for those who struggle visually.

Thank you for the opportunity to share ideas on Tuesday evening. Your roadshows are a welcome opportunity for feedback and it is an excellent start for a new administration to seek ideas from broader communities within the Borough.

Mervyn Brown has drawn your and Milan's attention to the Beeston and District Civic Society #Beeston2020Vision consultation over the Covid years and the lively follow up community event Our Beeston - Our Future on 27 April 2022.

These were generally positive conversations generating many ideas about shaping the future of Beeston and to some extent the Borough over the next decade. Some hint at management adjustments that might generate quick wins for the Council and others.

There is an excellent record of both the consultation responses and the event on the Beeston and District Civic Society website under the Society's 'Events' heading.

More specifically Item 96 records the principal findings of the Our Beeston - Our Future community event, with Item 97 recording the flavour of individual table discussions. Item 98 records real time voting on ten core issues, with closing remarks from chairman Sir Martyn Poliakoff, himself a Freeman of this Borough.

The Society continues to develop and prioritise these ideas. Taken together they are a valuable resource deriving directly from community engagement over an extended time and which might usefully complement your own feedback exercise.
